Practical Magic is a captivating film about two sisters, Gillian and Sally, who grow up in a town where magic is real. Their mother's death leaves them with their eccentric aunts, Jet and Frances, who teach them the ways of witchcraft. The sisters eventually become successful women, but their lives are marked by tragedy and heartbreak. As they navigate love, loss, and family secrets, Gillian finds herself in a complicated relationship with her boyfriend Jimmy, while Sally stays committed to her life on the island. When Jimmy's dark past is revealed, Sally must intervene, leading to unexpected consequences. The film also delves into themes of trauma, abuse, and community acceptance, as well as the power of love and destiny. Stockard Channing, who played one of the aunts, reflects on the film's enduring appeal and her own experience working on it. I've watched that VHS tape more than once, and people often say it's one of their favorites too. Especially from women - I'm not sure why they like it so much, but it's nice to know there are others who feel the same way about it. The movie is set during a really happy time in my life, which was spent in Los Angeles. I had met Griffin Dunne, who played my husband, and we had all these mutual friends, including Dianne Wiest. We were talking one evening, and he asked me if I wanted to do the movie, and I said yes. I'd seen the script beforehand, but it was mostly a conversation that led to us doing the film. It happened quite quickly, for some reason. What stuck with me was the look of the witches - how they were going to bring those characters to life. Dianne had her own ideas about her character's appearance, and we worked closely with Judianna Makovsky on the costumes. She created something truly marvelous - the makeup and hair for my character didn't quite work at first because I wasn't wearing much makeup, but it was all part of creating a unique look. We wanted to make the characters stand out from time, not look old or worn out. The more eccentric we got with the clothes and accessories, the better it looked. Were there any references to witches in pop culture? No, not at all - I think that's what made it interesting. And working with Andrew Dunn as my DP really helped bring everything together. Looking back, I don't think it was as over-the-top as some of Stevie Nicks' performances. But Judianna Makovsky added a sense of timelessness and femininity to the movie - all those fabrics, beads, and jewelry made her characters feel special. It wasn't just about being "witchy" but also staying grounded in reality. The relationships between all these women were at the heart of the story. Griffin's main priority was the nieces and their relationships, rather than just playing witches. When it came to meeting the rest of the cast, it was a very congenial situation, with Nic and Sandy being enormously warm and funny. The experience of shooting the film was playful, but also hard work, especially for scenes like the one where Nic was on the floor writhing around, which took days to shoot. The team shot on location in Friday Harbor, off Seattle, and used a soundstage for other scenes. For the midnight margaritas scene, the cast decided to have a drink to make the scene more authentic, but it's unclear how drunk they actually were. Nicole Kidman allegedly provided the tequila, but the details are fuzzy. One of the challenging scenes to shoot was the possession scene, which required a lot of people and choreography. The green-screen flying scenes were also uncomfortable, with the cast wearing harnesses. Working with child actors, including Evan Rachel Wood, was a unique experience, and they turned out to be lovely and talented. The film's release abroad had an interesting clause, where actors could dub the movie if they spoke a certain language, and one of the actors claimed to speak French, leading to a humorous experience in Paris. The film's French dubbing process was a challenging experience for me, as I had to narrate the opening scenes and deal with language barriers between myself and the lead actress, who didn't speak much English. This resulted in several long days of work, and I learned a valuable lesson from the experience - which was later reinforced by her comment that I have a Bulgarian accent! It turns out that I'm featured in a French-dubbed version of Practical Magic, although I doubt anyone would be able to notice or care. Looking back, I think the film's reception was mixed upon its release due to its eclectic mix of themes and tones, which might have made it difficult for audiences to pin down. However, over time, it has developed a cult following, with many people appreciating its unique portrayal of female relationships and the way the women in the story navigate their entanglements with men. The fact that people can watch the movie in the comfort of their own homes, thanks to VHS and DVD technology, has also contributed to its enduring popularity. When I reflect on why Practical Magic has stood the test of time, I think it's because of its distinctiveness and the high quality of its production values - including its visuals and performances. Despite my initial reservations about watching myself in the film, I've been told that many fans revisit it multiple times, due to its uniqueness and emotional resonance. Stop you on the street and say they love your movie, but honestly, because it wasn't as big of a deal initially. I've noticed over time how many people bring it up to me. Of all my work, is this something that's frequently mentioned? It's definitely in there, mainly by women. Do you believe in any of the magic from the film? Like, do I truly believe in real magic or supernatural stuff? Even normal-life magic - like jinxes or coincidence - that's what I find fascinating. Coincidence is the magic of life, and if we didn't have it, things would be too predictable. We have to accept it as a fact, even when we don't want to. That's what makes life magical.
