and indirect object pronouns in your French you will be able to cut down your sentences and make them flow more naturally allowing you to become more fluent direct object pronouns in French and English are a way to shorten sentences they are used instead of a noun so for example instead of saying the work is over there you would say it is over there in this instance work is the noun that is being replaced with the direct pronoun it indirect object pronouns in French and English are similar to direct pronouns in regard to what their use is it is used to replace the noun that is the indirect subject of a verb so for example if you were to say I did the run with Martin it would become I did it with him in this instance martin is the noun that is being replaced with the indirect as you can see for the most part the direct and indirect object pronouns in French tend to be the same only changing when you are referring to him/her/it and them when using these pronouns with words that begin with a vowel or a h it is important to remember to use the second variation such as l instead of le or la rules for using direct and indirect pronouns in french when using direct and indirect object pronouns in French the gender pronoun that you will be using is based upon the gender of the noun it is replacing so la journée for example would be replaced using the feminine object pronoun regardless of who is talking for the same reason the noun that is being replaced also determines whether the direct or indirect pronoun used will be the singular or the plural like it would be in English so when talking about a group that you are not a part of or multiple people the pronoun will be the one used for them regardless of gender while the noun that that will be replaced tends to follow after the verb direct and indirect pronouns usually appear before it when using French how to tell when to use french direct or indirect object pronouns determining whether to use a direct or indirect object pronoun in French largely depends on whether there is a preposition being used before the noun in the sentence that you are changing it for and if there is which one is in use as with all grammar lessons there are a few rules that you can learn to make it easier for you if there isnt a preposition before the noun then as a general rule you can assume it will be a direct object pronoun for example nous cuisinons le diner there isnt a preposition in place before le diner which means that a direct object pronoun is needed so it becomes nous le cuisinons I give foods to Emilie because of the preposition a used before Emilies name it implies that an indirect object pronoun is needed therefore the sentence becomes je lui donne à manger exceptions to the rules of indirect and direct object pronouns in French as always there are always exceptions to the rules for how to tell when you can and cant use an object pronoun in French also in FrenchTo avoid repetition and sound natural, use object pronouns in French, specifically direct and indirect object pronouns. Direct object pronouns replace the noun that receives the action of a verb, while indirect object pronouns indicate the recipient of the action. Direct Object Pronouns (Je, la, les) Le = him/it (masculine singular), La = her/it (feminine singular), Les = them (plural) Examples: Without pronouns - "J'entends la chanson." ("I hear the song."), "Il connaît les enfants." ("He knows the children.") With direct object pronouns - "Je le vois." ("I see him/it."), "Je la connais." ("I know her/it."), "Il les aime." ("He loves them.") Placement: In the present tense, the direct object pronoun is placed before the verb. Il la regarde. (I am watching her/it.) In compound tenses, like the passé composé, the pronoun is still placed before the verb and sometimes agrees in gender and number with the past participle. Il l'a vue. (He saw her.) Nous les avons achetés. (We bought them.) Tips for beginners: Remember that le/la can mean both "him/her" or "it," depending on the gender of the noun. Les is always plural, regardless of whether you're referring to people or things. Indirect Object Pronouns (lui, leur) Lui = to him/her (singular), Leur = to them (plural) Examples: Without pronouns - "Je parle à Marie." ("I am speaking to Marie."), "Il donne un cadeau à son ami." ("He gives a gift to his friend.") With indirect object pronouns - "Je lui parle." ("I am speaking to her/him."), "Il lui donne un cadeau." ("He gives a gift to him/her.") Placement: Just like with direct object pronouns, indirect object pronouns are placed before the verb. Il lui parle. (He is speaking to her/him.) Combining Direct and Indirect Object Pronouns When using both a direct and an indirect object pronoun in the same sentence, the indirect pronoun always comes before the direct pronoun.
