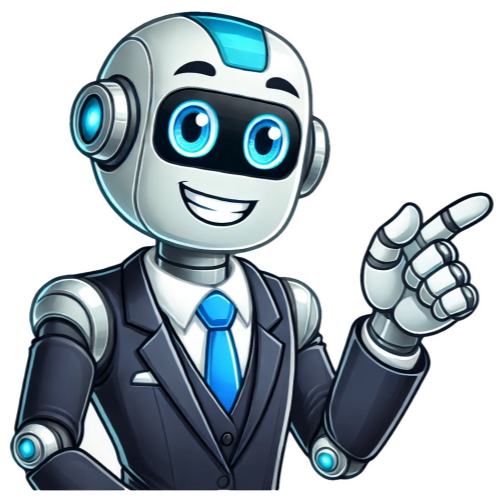

It may look daunting, but it does have all the information you need. Read through the "Rules of the Road" section of the manual. Take notes if anything strikes you as surprising.
