Expect a bigger bathroom, some featuring a desirable bathtub and oversized waterfall shower, and vast storage for your maritime wardrobe. It's the fine-cut glass of Champagne to your moments of repose—a little indulgence to set the sail of your vacation on a course for opulent pleasure.The time has come to stand the nautically inclined staterooms against each other in a daring duel of features and value. Comparing the NCL Club Balcony with the tried and tested Balcony Room. Which one will win in your book.Club Balcony view on the Gem.When it comes to space, the Club Balcony has more square footage than the Balcony Room. This will come with a full-length sofa or sofa bed, giving it the edge for couples or pairs traveling together. Ultimately, the Mini Suite tugs at the heartstrings of those craving a little extra room to spread their vacation wings. You will notice more space between the couch and beds also, possibly a small table in between depending on which cruise ship you are traveling on. A larger bathroom with a bathtub and larger shower is nice for the club balcony suite, but the room is not that much larger than the balcony room's bedroom. Still being able to soak in a tub if you like is a wonderful thing if you have been out in the port walking all day making your feet and legs ache. The extra closet space is also a benefit for this room type. You will have plenty of storage space with a couple side by side closets. You will be able to hang all your closets if you like plus there will be drawers. On one of the cruises, I have been on / noticed the TV was larger in the mini suite also. Some might notice a large balcony, but that is not the case in every comparison view from my balcony in Lisbon.In the enchanted world of cruise fare, the Mini Suite often takes the lead in terms of a higher cost. It's important to weigh your penchant for extra space against the backdrop of your cruise priorities. If the grandeur of larger living quarters doesn't hold the celestial pull, the Balcony Room may be the financial and functional sweet spot. The extra cost can be substantial depending on which cruise you book.The perks of the Club Balcony Suite are more important to me than the size and closet space of the room. For example, if you are on a large ship where you should pre-book onboard entertainment, you are able to book 125 days before sailing. You will also receive 2 specialty restaurant dining experiences, 1 laundry service or pressing per sailing and a complimentary bottle of sparkling wine delivered to your stateroom. This is the biggest difference in my opinion between the 2 rooms.The Balcony staterooms, an established darling of the cruising scene, is like the old soul of the sea, drenched in romance and unfettered vistas. In a Balcony Room, you're merely a glass door away from a private sighting of the world's endless amphitheater—the sea, the sky, and the sun. From The Norwegian Bliss to the Norwegian Encore, you will notice differences to every club balcony or standard balcony cabin if you compare them between all the ships. The best way to help determine what you would like to stay in is watch YouTube videos or read forums on Cruise Critic. For example, the Balcony room on the Epic has an amazing amount of closet space, compared to the closest space of the balcony room on the Gem. But I did like the living space better on the Gem compared to the Epic. There was just more room to walk.The NCL website is extremely helpful when looking at deck plans and trying to figure out which room you would like to stay in. If looking for cabins right beside each other because you are traveling with a large group, look for the connecting room icon on the deck plan. This will help you pick rooms that can connect from the inside. Deck plans are also great in helping you choose if you would like a room near an elevator or away from the elevator. Or a room above the theater or right below the pool deck. Every room will have a different amount of noise due to what's around them, this is something that can be figured out by looking at deck plans. NCL also offers Guaranteed Staterooms at the time of booking where they choose the room for you instead of you picking it. This might help to lower the price of the room, but also you might end up close to an elevator and hear more foot traffic than other rooms. I personally have never had an issue with noise, but it is something to consider.View from my balcony pulling into Lisbon.Also, the handicapped accessible rooms can be spotted on the deck plans, there will be more square footage because of the use of a wheelchair, but every ship is different in the style of room, storage space. The amount of Handicap accessible rooms vary but are offered in both the standard balcony and club balcony levels, and they offer easy access for wheelchairs and electric scooters.I have stayed on the Norwegian Jewel, Norwegian Jade and Norwegian Sky also, so I have plenty of experience with older Norwegian ships on the fleet. I am only lacking the Norwegian Pearl for that class of ship. Just remember that the NCL fleet also has many stateroom options. What is a Club Balcony Suite?A Club Balcony Suite on Norwegian Cruise Line is a step up from a standard Balcony stateroom, offering a more spacious layout, enhanced amenities, and additional perks. Formerly known as a Mini-Suite, the Club Balcony Suite provides an upgraded cruising experience without the higher price tag of a full suite. These rooms are available across multiple NCL ships and are designed for guests looking for added comfort during their voyage.Club Balcony Suite PerksOne of the biggest advantages of booking a Club Balcony Suite is the range of exclusive benefits that come with it. Here are some of the notable perks:Early Booking Access: Guests staying in Club Balcony Suites can pre-book onboard entertainment and specialty dining reservations up to 125 days before sailing, giving them an edge in securing preferred options.Complimentary Onboard Treats: Guests receive two food and beverage amenity deliveries per sailing, providing an added touch of indulgence.Laundry and Pressing Service: Each Club Balcony Suite guest is entitled to one complimentary laundry bag or pressing service per sailing, ensuring their clothing stays fresh throughout the trip.Welcome Bottle of Sparkling Wine: Upon embarkation, guests are greeted with a complimentary bottle of sparkling wine, setting the tone for a celebratory experience.Enhanced Bathroom Facilities: Club Balcony Suites feature larger bathrooms with double sinks and expanded showers, providing additional convenience and luxury.What's the Difference Between a Balcony and Club Balcony Suite Stateroom?While both Balcony and Club Balcony Suites offer private balconies and comfortable accommodations, there are several key differences.A balcony stateroom is generally smaller in size and features a standard bathroom setup. It provides a cozy and functional space for guests who prioritize the private balcony experience while maintaining a budget-friendly option. However, Balcony staterooms do not come with exclusive perks such as early booking access, complimentary amenities, or upgraded bathroom facilities.On the other hand, a Club Balcony Suite offers more space, both in the main living area and the bathroom. The bathroom upgrade includes double sinks and a larger shower, providing added comfort. Club Balcony Suites also come with priority booking benefits, food and beverage deliveries, complimentary laundry service, and a welcome bottle of sparkling wine, making them a more premium choice. So you've settled on a NCL cruise - a good choice - and now you're about to book. You know you want to enjoy a private balcony, because you want to have your own private space to enjoy the sunrise and sunset, or just a quiet spot to read a book and soak up the sun's rays. Sounds like bliss. But wait - with Norwegian Cruise Line, there is another option, which is the Club Balcony Suite. Not quite a full suite, this offers the chance to enjoy an enhanced cabin, but obviously at a slightly higher cost. So, what are the NCL Club Balcony Suite perks, and is it worth upgrading, or should you just stick with a regular Balcony Stateroom? Let's take a look. A Club Balcony (above) and Club Balcony Suite (below) On a NCL ship, a Club Balcony is a level of accommodation that's better than a balcony, but not as luxurious as a full suite. With other cruise lines, these are called mini suites or superior deluxe balcony rooms. There are four options of Balcony staterooms with NCL, not including the full suites that you can book. These are: Balcony Staterooms Family Balcony Staterooms Club Balcony Suites Family Club Balcony Stateroom. How much larger will vary depending on the specific ship, but a Club Balcony Suite can be as large as 285 square feet, while the biggest Balcony Staterooms max out at 205 square feet - though Family Balcony Staterooms are a little larger, with a maximum size of 216 square feet. It's not a huge amount of extra room - if you want something really spacious, with properly separate bedrooms and sitting rooms - then you're going to need to look at more expensive suites in The Haven. Some of the additional space is for the bathroom and that does make a bit of a difference, since it won't feel as crowded, particularly in the shower which can be cramped for some people. There is a curtain to divide the living area with the sofa bed from the main sleeping area. This can be good for families who may like a little more privacy. It is nice to be able to stretch out a little more, especially if you're travelling with more than two people in a room, but this perk could be something you could live without. Staying in a Club Balcony Suite gets you a few extra amenities included, that you wouldn't get when booking a Balcony Stateroom. These amenities are: A distinctive purple keycard for your room, so you can show off your Club Balcony status A bottle of sparkling wine on embarkation day Treats delivered to your stateroom twice per week - canapes, cookies, chocolate-covered strawberries, that sort of thing Bathrobes included in your room to use during the cruise (not to keep, sorry!) It's important to note that guests in a regular Balcony Stateroom can get bathrobes too, but you'd need to request them, and availability for those guests can sometimes be limited. The list of extra amenities isn't huge, but there are some nice little extras to enhance your stay. There are also a small list of perks you get with a Club Balcony Suite: You'll get one free bag of laundry during your cruise, which would normally cost you around \$25. All you need to do is fill the bag with your dirty laundry (carefully - they are a little delicate) and leave it on your bed. Your cabin steward will then take it to laundry services for you, and it'll be returned to you washed and ironed. You'll get it back the next day if the laundry is collected the morning, but if it's the afternoon or evening then give it two days. Club Balcony Suite guests can book the onboard dining experiences 125 days before they set sail. That's five days earlier than regular Balcony Stateroom guests, so you get a small advantage in securing the best times at the most popular restaurants. However, be aware that guests staying in The Haven get to book their dining experiences 130 days before setting sail, so you won't be getting first choice, but you still shouldn't have an issue securing the places that you want to go. It used to be that Club Balcony Suite guests could pre-book their entertainment on the cruise early as well, but that's no longer the case. Now, Club Balcony Suite guests can book entertainment 21 days before setting sail, which is the same as guests in regular Balcony Staterooms. Only guests in The Haven or other suites, or who have reached Platinum tier or above in the Latitudes loyalty programme, can book earlier. There isn't a set price difference between regular Balcony Staterooms and Club Balcony Suites - it will all depend on demand, the specific itinerary and the dates. Expect to pay anywhere between 12% and 40% more for a Club Balcony Suite. I did a couple of test bookings for Club Balcony Suites in writing this guide, and found an 11-day cruise where a regular Balcony Stateroom would cost £1,107 per person, while a Club Balcony Suite would cost £1,307 per person, so that's only an extra £200 each - not a huge increase. But I also found a cruise on Norwegian Aqua, the newest ship in the fleet, where a Club Balcony Suite was £1,879 per person, while a regular Balcony Stateroom was just £1,354 per person - so a difference of over £500 per person. And this was a shorter cruise, too, so it's not just the length of the cruise making the difference. Club Balcony Suites pay the same daily service charges as a regular Balcony Stateroom - \$20 per person, per day. It used to be that Club Balcony Suites would have their own pricing tier, between regular staterooms and suites, but this was changed in early 2023. So if you read anywhere that a Club Balcony Suite pays \$2 per day more for gratuities, you can ignore that - that's the old policy. There's no definitive answer on whether a Club Balcony Suite is worth it, since the cost can vary so much. If you're paying for a regular Balcony Stateroom then you're getting a regular Balcony Stateroom, but if you're paying for a Club Balcony Suite then you're getting a Club Balcony Suite. But if you find a cruise where the difference is only 1150-200 per person, then you might be tempted - especially if you don't want to feel cramped in the shower onboard. The value of the amenities depends on how much you'll enjoy them, but the Club Balcony Suites are nicer rooms - just don't overpay when you don't get a huge amount extra.
